**U.S. Rep. Marc Veasey Introduces Legislation to Protect Victims of Notario Fraud**

*H.R. 5228, The Notario Victim Relief Act aims to assist immigrants who have been victims of fraudulent and unethical legal representation*

**Washington, D.C.** — Today, Congressman Marc Veasey (TX-33) unveiled H.R. 5228, the *Notario Victim Relief Act* to assist immigrants who have been victims of fraudulent immigration practices. This legislation allows victims of immigration fraud to have unlimited time to refile their immigration related paperwork, permitting them to have an opportunity to reopen their cases and immigrate lawfully.

“Notario fraud” happens when an unauthorized immigration consultant, sometimes known as a “notario” or “notario público” provides legal advice or services without legal authorization. Since 2002, more than 75 businesses in Texas have been shut down for providing unauthorized legal services. There is no federal statute that specifically addresses the unauthorized practice of immigration law, though federal authorities are able to prosecute using other statutes.

“While America waits for House Republicans in Washington to bring immigration reform to the floor for a vote, we cannot forget about the invisible victims of the broken U.S. immigration process. When immigration is in the news, scam artists see an opportunity. House Republicans’ reckless delay has confused the public and allowed scam artists to prey on our immigrant communities. This is a serious national problem that causes suffering for Texas families and weighs on an already overburdened immigration system. By working with advocacy groups like the National Association of Latino Elected and Appointed Officials (NALEO), we have crafted legislation that would allow victims of notario fraud to reopen their cases and immigrate lawfully. This legislation is just the first step towards stopping fraudulent immigration services in our nation.”

## **Rep. Marc Veasey to Host Workshop on Combating Notario Fraud**

**Fort Worth, Texas**—This week, Congressman Marc Veasey, TX-33, will launch efforts to educate immigrants about the dangers of immigration service provider fraud starting with the FREE Workshop on *Combating Notario Fraud and Immigration Clinic*, on **Saturday, August 16<sup>th</sup> from 9:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. at Northside Community Center in Fort Worth, Texas.**

Veasey launches this anti-fraud campaign after introducing proposed (H.R. 5228, *The Notario Victim Relief Act*), legislation that aims to assist victims of immigration services fraud, which often involves individuals calling themselves “Notarios Publicos” and misrepresenting themselves as skilled experts in immigration law.

## **FACT SHEET: H.R. 5228, Notario Victim Relief Act**

**Overview:** In many Latin American countries, “notario publico” or “notarios” are state-appointed legal practitioners who possess even higher qualifications than an attorney. Here in the U.S. becoming a “notary public” requires very little in the way of training. “Notario fraud” happens when an unauthorized immigration consultant, sometimes known as a “notario,” provides legal advice or services without legal authorization. These kinds of fraud schemes are not uncommon.

When immigration is in the news, scam artists see an opportunity. As the debate on immigration reform rages on we’ve noticed a spike in these fraud cases in immigrant communities. Since 2002, more than 75 businesses in Texas have been shut down for providing unauthorized legal services, but currently, there is no federal statute that specifically addresses the unauthorized practice of immigration law. This is a serious national problem that causes suffering for Texas families and weighs on an already overburdened immigration system.

### **What the bill does:**

- Amends the statute of limitations in the Immigration and Nationality Act to remove the 90 day time limit to refile immigration related paperwork.

### **Who it will impact:**

- Victims of notario fraud in diverse immigrant communities so that they have an opportunity to reopen their immigration cases.

### **Why we need it:**

- There is currently no federal statute that specifically addresses the unauthorized practice of immigration law or helps victims of unauthorized practice of immigration law.

# Immigration reform can curb fraud

Shady advisers prey on many trying to do right thing, says **Marc Veasey**

**D**uring my tenure in public service, first as a state legislator and now as a U.S. congressman, it has been painful to watch our broken immigration system prevent the great state of Texas from reaching its full potential.

The U.S. Senate passed a bipartisan immigration bill more than a year ago. That bill could have passed in the House the next day and been signed into law the following day, but the House Republican leadership has refused to bring comprehensive immigration reform to the floor for a vote.

As a result, much of the public is rightfully confused about what options are available for those waiting to renew or apply for legal status. While there are many community, religious and non-profit organizations providing legitimate immigration-related services, there is also a growing number of nonlawyers posing as legal consultants, often known as *notarios*, who are not licensed or qualified to give legal advice.

My congressional office has recently seen a rise in constituent-service cases for victims of *notarios* and others masquerading as legitimate providers of immigration services. One such victim, Daniel, allowed me to share his story.

hardworking family man who lawfully immigrated to the U.S. from El Salvador three decades ago, desired to be reunited with his family. He hoped that he could sponsor their move now that he is a U.S. citizen. Last fall, Daniel heard an advertisement for immigration services on a Christian radio station. In October, Daniel visited the self-proclaimed immigration-services provider, who said he could petition for Daniel's daughter and promised that she would be in the U.S. by December 2014.

Six months later, Daniel is out \$3,800 and had not received word from the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services about his daughter's petition. Daniel knew he should have at least received confirmation that his application was received. He contacted the *notario*, but wasn't satisfied with his response. As a result, Daniel reached out to our congressional office.

Our office confirmed that Daniel's application was never filed. He had lost six months and \$3,800 and was no closer to bringing his daughter to the U.S.

Daniel's story is not unique and is just one of thousands that highlight the need for Congress to assist immigrants who are the victims of fraudulent practices and to educate them on the dangers of service-provider fraud.

This August, I will be working with advocacy organizations and communities to gain feedback needed to create legislation that protects victims and provides our communities with the information and tools necessary to avoid falling prey to fraudulent practices.

While I continue to provide a voice for our vulnerable communities in the 33rd Congressional District in Texas, what America needs is for House Republicans in Washington to address the most dire issues facing our nation.

It is time to bring comprehensive immigration reform to the floor for a vote.

### Perry's border move is just a single step

In what should come as a surprise to no one, Gov. Rick Perry said Monday that he will send up to 1,000 National Guard troops to the Texas border to bolster the response to the flood of Central American migrants into the U.S.

Perry said it is not the recent headline-grabbing influx of unaccompanied minors that prompted his move.

Speaking in Austin, the governor told reporters that these migrant children make up only 20 percent of the total apprehensions on the border.

But detaining and caring for the deluge of kids has taken an inordinate amount of the Border Patrol's time and resources, both of which should be spent on the agency's primary mission of catching criminals crossing the border. Criminals, said the governor, are exploiting gaps in enforcement while border agents are distracted.

Last month, Perry and state leaders announced they would spend \$1.3 million a week for a surge of Department of Public Safety officers on the border.

Perry credited a recent

Further, it's unclear whether the ramped-up DPS presence is responsible for the dip in illegal migrants. U.S. diplomatic efforts aimed at preventing kids from fleeing their homelands in the first place may be having some effect on would-be travelers.

And the volume and intensity of media coverage on the topic — which has surely filtered back to Central America — is probably a deterrent force in its own right.

In ordering troops to the border, Perry is thumbing his nose at the president. He's also getting ahead of members of his own party, including Rep. Kay Granger of Fort Worth, whose special House working group is expected to call on the president to mobilize the National Guard in recommendations due out this week.

Perry's move also comes with a high cost to Texans — \$12 million a month — and no guarantee that the federal government will reimburse the state.

But absent any federal action — approval of the president's \$3.7 billion supplemental funding request, passage of a bill

## Immigrants can fall victim to fraud

Consultants known as *notarios* often are not licensed or qualified to give legal advice on immigration status.


It's been more than a year since the Senate passed a bipartisan immigration bill, yet House Republican leadership has refused to bring comprehensive immigration reform to the floor for a vote.

Much of the public is rightfully confused about what options are available for those waiting to renew or apply for their legal status. While there are many community, religious and non-profit organizations providing legitimate immigration-related services, there is also a growing number of non-lawyers posing as legal consultants, often known as *notarios*, who are not licensed or qualified to give legal advice.

My congressional office has recently seen a rise in constituent service cases for victims of *notarios* and others masquerading as legitimate providers of immigration services. One such victim, Daniel, agreed to let me share his story.

After lawfully immigrating to the United States from El Salvador more than three decades ago, Daniel, a Texas resident and hardworking family man, desired to be reunited with his family and hoped that he might be able to sponsor their move here now that he is a U.S. citizen.

In the fall of 2013, Daniel heard an advertisement through an AM Christian radio station for immigration services. In October, Daniel vis-

ited the self-proclaimed immigration services provider, who said he could petition for his daughter and promised that she would be in the U.S. by December 2014.
